

# Revived Glen Tay Block Race In 10th Year, Future Bright

The 1976 Glen Tay Block Race was the 10th consecutive since the event was revived in 1967 for Perth's 151st birthday bash.

The race dates back to around the turn of the century and 69 years ago E. B. Code, an outstanding Perth athlete, won the race in a time of almost 55 minutes.

It went into limbo for many years until the Birthday people pulled it from mothballs, and by getting a top track man such

as Tom Graham to organize it, the event has become a success in the 70's and the future would seem to be bright.

This year there were 52 runners and all of them seemed quite pleased with the course and the arrangements. There was some traffic problem in the town section but this will definitely be corrected for '77, according to Tom.

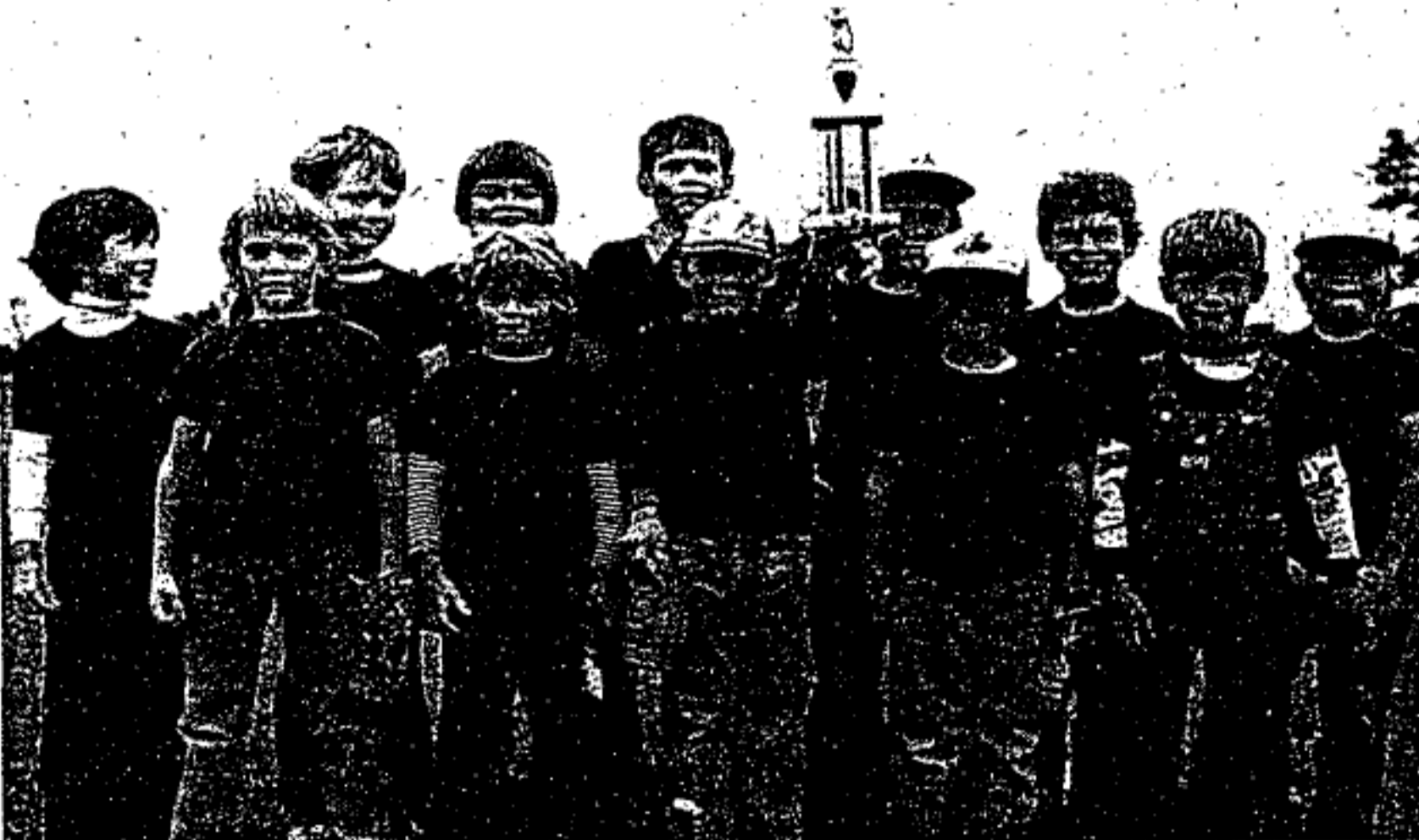
Legion are the league champions.

The top two finishers in each division plus fourth other best finishers according to their time received heavy sweat tops this season and all other runners received T-shirts imprinted "Glen Tay Block Race" and the Legion crest flanked by "Perth" and "1976".

It is the only race in the country where ALL competitors receive a memento of the event and this particular aspect seems

to create quite a hit with the runners. It also distinctly advertises Perth and this annual race.

The William Wilson Memorial Trophy goes to the race winner each year and in the absence of Jack Wilson this season, the trophy was presented by Peter Code, chairman of prizes. Susan Sullivan, 1976 Miss Perth, was also in attendance to congratulate the winners on behalf of the town.

There were nine Perth entries in this year's race, eight boys and one girl. Stan Earl was the first local runner across the finish line, with a clocking of 54:31.

In 33rd place was Junior runner Ross Ferguson at 64:19, one of the future stars of the P&DCL on the heels of brothers Howard and Don Ferguson. Then in 40th was younger brother Harry from Drummond Central School with a timing of 70:36.

Brian Campbell crossed in 70:55 and 45th was Pete Cordick at 72:51. Ralph Moulton was 49th at 77:21 and 49th was Tony Ma-

jaury 78:30. Jim Clark was 51st at 88:02, and Perth's lone girl entry, Leslie Henderson, was 52nd at 102:23.
