Bob Wilson went all the way on the mound for Lanark scattering 5 hits, fanning 7, and walking 2. Ken McIntosh tossed 3 frames from McDonalds walking 3, fanning 4 spacing 3 hits, and being charged with 4 runs. Brian Tysick completed the final 2 frames, was tagged for 7 safeties, struck out 3, but didn't walk a batter.

Gary Gemmill and Dale Bowes set the pace at the plate for Lanark with 2 for 3's while Elwin McKinnon had a perfect 2 for 2 to lead the Corners.

Six errors did little to help the McDonalds cause. Lanark was fairly tight afield with one bobble.

Before Tractor Pull Pulls A far cry from what Tractors once were

Gasoline - powered tractors have certainly undergone some interesting changes since their development from the steam traction engine in the late nineteenth century.

Back then, the machines were widely used for operating grain threshers and, to a small extent, for ploughing.

Steam ploughs were used toward the end of the 1880's on the large ranches in the north-western United States, Canada and other regions where large-scale production was involved.

Early technical development was chiefly toward large tractors designed to operate from six to 12 plough bottoms.

Development of the internal combustion engine tractor began in the U.S. and largely continued there.

As early as 1892, the J.I. CASE Threshing Machine Company, then the largest manufacturer of steam engines in the world, produced their first petrol-powered machine which

closely resembled a steam tractor in appearance.

It failed commercially because of carburation problems which were partly rectified by 1895, when Case produced and found a market for two-cylinder machines.

In Great Britain, Hornsby and Son of Grantham were producing an 18 horsepower oil-fired Agricultural Locomotive in 1897, and were followed by Ransome, who offered a 10-ton machine capable of running on paraffin or oil.

Like the steam engines before them, these early motor tractors were beset by faults.

In 1902, John Froelich of Iowa produced the first of what was to become the John Deere line of tractors.

It was powered by 20 horsepower, single cylinder petrol engine made by Van Dusen of Cincinnati, and incorporated a friction clutch and forward and reverse gears.
